Sunrise, sunset and twilight—Defining when daylight and darkness occur

When traveling by boat around the clock—out of sight of land with an unobstructed horizon—you get to observe (in clear weather) the true rising and setting of the sun. The actual time of sunrise and sunset are defined as the time when the upper edge of the sun's disc lies on the unobstructed horizon. The exact time at which you observe this phenomenon depends on many factors, including atmospheric conditions, your elevation, sea conditions, and when on land, the terrain you look over.

When observing sunrise and sunset at sea, you notice that the sky has already brightened before the sun rises and brightness continues after the sun sets. Twilight is the period between sunset and darkness and between darkness and sunrise when some outdoor activities can continue for a limited time without artificial light.

In marine navigation we use two periods of twilight: civil twilight and nautical twilight. Civil twilight begins in the morning or ends in the evening when the center of the sun lies 6 degrees below the horizon. During this period ordinary outdoor activities can be performed without artificial illumination. Nautical twilight begins in the morning or ends in the evening when the center of the sun lies 12 degrees below the horizon. During this time (and in the absence of other illumination) general outlines of objects may be distinguishable, but outdoor operations aren't possible.

A third defined period of twilight (not generally used), astronomical twilight, is defined as the period beginning in the morning and ending in the evening when the sun lies 18 degrees below the horizon. Before astronomical twilight begins in the morning and ends in the evening, the sky has no illumination from the sun, making objects practically imperceptible.

To learn more about the sun and stars and how they can be used in marine navigation, consider taking the United States Power Squadrons Junior Navigation and Navigation courses. –Tom Dailey

Annual General Meeting #56, May 5, 2016

The Squadron Nominating Committee is normally chaired by the immediate Squadron Past Commander, the remainder of the committee then consisting of the current Squadron Commander, and the immediate Past-Past Commander. Unfortunately, due to an extra-ordinary situation where the immediate Past Commander and the immediate Past-Past Commander are unable to fulfil the responsibilities of the nominating committee per Squadron policies, the duties of Chair have been assumed by the next previous P/Cdr available and the remaining committee consists of the current Commander.

Over the last year, the Squadron saw a significant loss of bridge members, with the Commander nominated for 2015-2016 resigning at the 2015 AGM, and the Executive officer and the Admin officer resigning their positions over the course of the summer. Additionally the Bridge saw the 2015 immediate Past Commander not being able to fulfill their duties. The plans put in place by previous nominating committees for Bridge renewal were totally derailed.

The North Bay Squadron is very much a "Squadron at Risk". Officers have been recycled, in some cases for many years. There has not been a significant change-over in the Bridge for quite some time which is not necessarily healthy for the squadron. Change is to be viewed as a good thing, permitting new and fresh ideas to build upon the great work accomplished in the past.

I put it to all Squadron members, that everyone has a responsibility to build their Squadron. They committed to this when they became members. It is now time for all to fulfill that pledge and seek out new members and to build a new organization. The existing Bridge and the nominating committee cannot do this alone. If this doesn't happen, ultimately the Squadron will flounder and capsize, leaving all of us float on our own.
