Chief Commanda II


1945 h Pizza, potluck and refreshments

It has not been a good year for incidents, accidents, and fatalities. As a reminder, Rule #5 states you must maintain proper lookout by sight and hearing as well as any other means appropriate to the prevailing circumstances and conditions. Take all precautions to avoid collision. Take early and substantial steps to avoid other boats.

Know which is the give-away boat, but do not assume the other boat also knows the rules.

As well, we observed that people do not seem keen to help others anymore. Under International Law you are obligated to help if it's a distress situation. It can sometimes be hard to tell if someone needs help, so going over to ask someone if they are OK is the responsible thing to do.

Weather Radar

Have you been wondering why the weather radar hasn't shown precipitation in the area recently? That is because the radar has been offline since August 9, 2021 as it is being replaced.

Apparently they have extended the range of two radar stations - Montreal River Harbour near Salt Ste. Marie and Landrienne, QC east of Rouyn-Noranda.

But the lack of information can be dangerous for anyone relying on the radar. The previous radar map used to indicate it was non-operational, but the new one has no warning and no link to outages on that page. Please send your concerns to:

The numbers are suggesting that those with the most time on the water - sober or otherwise - are increasingly running into stuff and into one another. It seems that skippers who claim to have boating "experience" are the most likely to become a statistic. Experience just isn't what it used to be.

Back in the day, experience meant making landfall in the right postal code. This can now be accomplished hands-free or via point-and-click. Modern electronics are great tools, but they might not spot the dangers ahead.

The competent skipper must have few distractions. He does his chart work and holds a course by looking across the compass and out the windshield. And most certainly, "experience" does not mean using electronic tools to speed down the waterway mindlessly.
